

Water team update: Larry Lively



Meeting with Kevin Holland, Larry Lively, and Powell Wheeler.

Friends of Lake Glenville Board discussed how we might get more involved with Duke Lake Management in a meaningful way. Our purpose would be to benefit the lake and those who use it. Funding of a fish restocking program and/or adding fish attractors to the lake was offered as a possible project. The board gave unanimous approval for Gary Wright and Larry Lively to pursue options and report back to the board with their findings.

It was decided that Powell Wheeler with North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and our Duke contact Kevin Holland were the appropriate people to contact (bio's below). A lunch appointment was arranged. During the meeting I presented FLG's desire to enter into a meaningful project with Duke and North Carolina Wildlife Resources by helping with a fish restocking project and/or possibly creating fish attractors to increase fish habitat.

Powell advised that they had a pretty good handle on the fish restocking program but mentioned that they were planning to introduce "Honey Hole" fish attractors (picture below) in Lake Glenville this spring and summer. Project will install about 30 attractors in the lake at a cost of approximately \$120 each. I told him the board had discussed allocating an amount of our budget for a lake project and I felt certain that our board would be willing to provide some funds and possibly manpower to help with the fish attractor project.

Kevin was particularly interested in the type of attractors planned. Duke has concerns with objects getting into the flow of water thru the damn. Powell's approach seemed appropriate.

During the discussion Powell asked for a general overview of FLG's activities. I discussed many of the things we are involved in with the lake and the community. I told him about the areas that Doug and

Don oversee as well as the water samples that Gary and I take for testing by Environmental Quality Institute in Asheville. He was very interested in the evaluations that Doug and Don provide. I told him I would be happy to help him get a better perspective of their expertise this spring.

This will meet the board's desire to provide a meaningful service to Duke and NCWR. I felt good about the meeting and Gary and I look forward to presenting the proposal to the board at our spring meeting.

Kevin Holland: Lake Services Rep

Kevin is a native of Franklin, NC where he lives with his wife and two daughters. He graduated from Western Carolina University in 1991 and went to work for Drake Enterprises in Franklin. He was hired by Nantahala Power and Light in 1994, which became Duke Power in 1998; then Duke Energy in 2006 through different corporate mergers. He held different positions at Duke from Computer Programmer to Engineering Associate to GIS Technician. He took over the position of Lake Services Representative for the Nantahala Area in April of 2013 when Lisa Leatherman moved into her current position of District Manager.

Powell Wheeler: District 9 Lead Fisheries Biologist. Powell was born and raised in the Appalachians in southwestern Virginia. He earned his Bachelor's degree in Fisheries Science at Virginia Tech and his Master's Degree in Fisheries Science at The University of Florida. For his thesis project, he studied shoal bass in a stream in the Florida panhandle. He worked for the US Forest Service and the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries before starting with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission in 2002. Since then he has been stationed in District-9, which covers everything north, south, and west of Asheville. Powell mentioned that he couldn't be happier with the volume and diversity of the aquatic resources in his area.

MESSAGE FROM OUR LAKE SERVICES MANAGER

Hello Friends,

Spring is here and boating season is just around the corner. Before things get into full swing on the lake, I'd like to take this opportunity to remind everyone of a few activities that are prohibited due to the safety concerns they can pose.

The Shoreline Management Guidelines (SMG) cover the rights and restrictions for use and activity on all of Duke Energy's reservoirs. The following regulations are found in section I. Use of DPNA Shoreline Property, subsection D. Limitations and they include:



- Buoys, buoy lines. Buoys and buoy lines, other than those installed by Duke Energy or an authorized governmental agency, are not allowed on the lake.
- Floating trampolines and other large floating water toys. Floating trampolines and other large floating water toys may not be placed on the lake.
- Swim platforms. Swim platforms or other structures that are not permanently attached to an approved pier/dock are prohibited on the lake.

These are just a few of the regulations that are in place to help promote the safety of all those who enjoy Lake Glenville and the other lakes in the Nantahala Area. 2014 Fall Drawdown of Lake Glenville to Support Swim Area Construction

Due to frequent, heavy rainfall in 2013, Duke Energy postponed the construction of the public swim area and other amenities at the Pines Recreation Area on Lake Glenville. The Pines Recreation Area is west of the bridge on Pine Creek Road paralleling Lake Glenville.

Based on average precipitation forecasts, the plan is to start construction of amenities to the Pines Recreation Area in October 2014. Tropical activity or high amounts of rainfall may impact the schedule. A drawdown of 16 feet for Nov 1st through Dec. 1st is required for the proper and safe installation of the public swim beach. Lake Glenville will operate within its normal operating range of 90 to 94 feet through Labor Day, then start an aggressive drawdown to support construction of the swim area. Once the swim area work within the reservoir bed is complete, the lake will start to refill and operate within the annual ranges. In addition to the construction of a delineated public swim area of approximately 8,000 sq. ft. with a maximum depth of 7 feet when the lake elevation is 98 ft., a fishing pier will be constructed. A pump and haul vault toilet and trash receptacles will also be added. Light duty pavement will be added to the driveway and parking lot on the lake side of Pine Creek Road. Duke Energy will also complete Federal Energy Regulatory Commission required maintenance work on the two gates at the dam during drawdown.



Lake Glenville will be accessible during the drawdown by using the Powerhouse Access Area ramp.



Lake adjoining property owners who are interested in shoreline or pier/dock construction during the drawdown, should contact Duke Energy Lake Service Representative Kevin Holland to initiate the application process.

Lake Glenville (Thorpe) Operational Drawdown Plan Summer 2014 - Spring 2015




Key Project Elements:

- Duke Energy must install the Pines Recreation (Swimming Beach) and paint and recoat the spillway gates at both Lake Glenville.
- A 16-ft. drawdown is being planned to support the swimming area construction and provide for a safety margin for spillway gate painting.
- Once below the spillway gate sill (elevation 88 ft. only generation will be available for lowering the lake level.
- The swimming area installation will require a minimal lake level of 84 ft. for 30 days.
- Spillway gate paint is expected to take 6 weeks with lake levels below 88 ft.
- Thorpe Hydro Station is expected to remain in service through the project for lake level management.
- Once completed Lake Glenville will be allowed to return to levels within the normal operating range.

Lake Glenville (Thorpe) Operational Drawdown Plan Summer 2014 - Spring 2015 Continued

Key dates:

- June 1, 2014 begin drawing the lake down (but staying within the "Normal Target" operating band for as long as practical).
- Mid September 2014 the lake level goes below the Minimum Normal Target elevation.
- Late September Early October lake level goes below elevation 88 ft.
- November 1, 2014 lake level reaches 84 ft. and Duke holds this level.
- December 1, 2014 Lake Glenville is allowed to be begin refilling which is expected to reach the Normal Minimum Target operating band in mid-December 2014.



If you do not have a boat, a good place to watch is from the parking lot of the Hamburg Baptist Church on 107 North, just past Hattler Realty.

Fire Safety and Protection —May 17th Breakfast Speakers

Speakers for Friends of Lake Glenville's May 17th Breakfast speakers will be Randy Dillard, Fire Chief, Cashiers Glenville Volunteer Fire Dept. and Benji Rece, new Jackson County Ranger for NC Fire Services.

Cashiers Volunteer Fire Department, founded in 1967, serves the communities of Sapphire, Cashiers, Glenville, Big Ridge, Yellow Mountain, Pine Creek, Norton and Heady Mountain. Each year they face an increased volume of calls with a volunteer force.

.....a bit of Glenville history By Carol Adams, President, GAHS

Joy Cox Hooper and Phil Fowler, both who are past presidents of Friend of Lake Glenville and members of the Glenville Area Historical Society, share here their recollections about the Cox-Hooper lake properties and about the old Lanning home all in the area of Lakeside Circle Drive and Chimney Pond Road.

The following is from Joy Cox Hooper:

During summer of 1945 after vacationing at High Hampton, Edna and Plato Cox of Miami, with daughter Joy, decided to take a new road enroute to Gatlinburg. It was the newly completed Highway 107. When they went around a curve and saw beautiful Lake Glenville in front of them, it was love at first sight.

They stopped at the Glenville Gulf gas station which was McCoy's General Store. When asked about property for sale, Emory McCoy directed them down a dirt road to the home of Oscar Lanning and his family. The house was unpainted but very clean and had newspapers on the walls to keep out winter chill. O. L. Lanning had been a resident of Glenville since the turn of the century and was Justice of the Peace. He later gave Joy Cox Hooper his set (1903 edition) of Encyclopedia Americana. Joy still has the encyclopedias and Mrs. Lanning's spinning wheel!

That day Mr. Lanning sold Mr. Cox 25 acres on the lake across Wilson Road (now Chimney Pond Road), from his house. Subsequently Mr. Cox bought the land where the Lanning house is located and it was later sold to Mr. Sam Hutchison and then Tom Sawyer. The Coxes also owned some of the land across the road that joins Hutchison property.

At one time the property package included land above Lakeside Circle Drive, the 14 acres where the Cox-Hooper homes were on the lake (plus the caretaker's house which had been brought up from Old Glenville when the lake was built), Admiral's Point and Tom Sawyer's Tree Farm....a total of 128 acres. The Cox barn, pond and property entrance can be seen from the road. The plans for the Cox house were drawn in the soil by Mrs. Cox and the house was built by Jack Robinson who lived on Wilson Road. The timber was cut on the property and processed at a sawmill on Norton Road. The house was rough cut lumber with white pine floors with upstairs and downstairs porches facing the lake. They moved in the summer of 1946. It was one of the first out-of-state houses on the lake. Joy was the first girl to water ski on the lake. In the 1990's Joy was president of FLG for four years. Joy and her husband, Lambert, owned the island in front of the property for a number of years. The Cox/ Hooper families enjoyed fifty-eight Lake Glenville summers.

Mr. Cox built the small pond behind the Lanning house as well as the one at Tom Sawyer's. Glenn Kirkland used to store hay in the back of the Lanning house. "The largest black snake I have ever seen was "sleeping" on top of some hay there, said Joy!.

Mrs. Cox and her daughter Joy Cox Hooper sold the property several years ago.

And, from Phil Fowler:

The Oscar Lanning House was a nice farm home in the 1940's and before. I lived about 1/2 mile from the Lannings. My first visit to the home would have been around 1948 when I joined

Mr.& Mrs. Lanning's grandchildren for lunch. I don't exactly remember being invited; however, I just joined all the other "tow heads" at a large table. Mrs. Lanning was a great cook. It seemed that either fried chicken or pork was always on the table.

The Lannings had 13 grandchildren, most of them were towheads, who lived about 50 yards from the big house. As a child I played with Bobby Lanning often. We would eat apples in their great orchard across the road and then throw the apples at the abundant hornet bee nests hanging from the apple trees. The game was to see who could knock down the most nests without being stung. There was always one of us stung.

There were no TV's, etc. in those days. Movies were about an hour away -- on Saturdays. We were quite good at building tree houses out of scrap lumber. Today there are a few of those apple trees still standing. To the right of Mr. Oscar's house, two of his sons, Frank and Vollie, operated a small mechanic shop and garage. Mr. Oscar had once been some sort of "Magistrate" in Glenville and had his own set of Law Books.

Mrs. Lanning, a kind lady, would have probably been the person who invited me to join her grandchildren for lunch. Mr. Oscar "kinda" scared me as a 7 year old child. He walked with two "canes" and would shake his canes at us kids. He seemed to scare his grandchildren too. I think he may have enjoyed scaring us?

Mr. Lanning was considered an intelligent but contentious gentleman-very argumentative in the community. He lived to be quite old! The Lannings sold their property in the 1950's. Today the Lanning house property is a part of the Tom Sawyer Christmas Tree Farm.

Summary of Last Season Water Quality Activities 2013 Doug Odell-Water Team Chair

The season appeared to get started as a normal summer. But as the summer progressed it became a very wet summer. Our water quality efforts progressed as planned and the results confirmed a typical summer. Thanks to Larry Lively and Gary Wright, our Stream Testing and Monitoring program provided confirmation with no significant deviations or surprises from our inflows. High rain falls did show expected increased sedimentation.

Larry and Gary collect the stream water samples and transport them to the Ashville lab. When the VWIN program was terminated from UNC Ashville, the Environmental Quality Institute was created as a 501(c)3 to support the VWIN volunteer network. The lab supports several hundred volunteers with water samples collected from across western Carolina. We pay for the laboratory analysis support at reduced costs.

Don Hanson's lake analysis added to our knowledge of the lake characteristics and basically yielded expected results. The temperature and dissolved oxygen data was used to identify the bottom of the expected life sustaining depth. The chlorophyll data was used to locate the depth of the greatest algae concentration.

The algae sampling started out being similar to previous years. A few unusual forms appeared. It is difficult to know if these differences are changes in life form or if they are a newly seen species. Algae identification can be difficult. Late in the season, September and October, there were some significant changes seen. One of our algae species typically looks like links of sausages and full of chlorophyll. In the fall these algae cells were thin as pencil lines with very little chlorophyll. Other species had similar characteristics. There was also a significant reduction of the quantity of the algae forms that eat the phytoplankton. It is believed that the long overcast and rainy season impacted the chlorophyll and algae growth which created a food shortage for the other algae forms. It will be interesting as to what we will find this spring.

Lake Conferences

Southeastern Lake and Watershed Management Conference 2014 Doug Odell

The Southeastern Conference held in Asheville and hosted by the North Carolina Lake Management Society was an excellent conference. The participation has grown significantly with many representatives from North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida. The lake studies with the data obtained and presented was of high quality. Contacts made will assist our water quality activities. There was an emphasis on the spread of invasive plants and cyano bacteria and algae across the Southeastern water bodies.

The early bird sessions were; Chlorophyll Confusion and Analysis; and Basic Limnology for Lake Monitoring. Some of the major topics were Watershed Management, Nutrient Modeling, In Lake Treatment, Chemistry of Algae, Changing Biology and Water Quality Modeling.

The keynote speaker was Mitch Gillespie the new Assistant Secretary of North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources. He outlined the recent reorganization of DEHNR and the reduction of state funding.

Within the Watershed Management sessions, Carolyn Franz, presented "FLG's Water Quality Programs" that she had presented to our county commission. A little more PR for our activities.

One of the sessions described the effort to find and trace the cause of water bird deaths. It was found that the birds had been eating the invasive plant hydrilla that was contaminated with a toxic cyanobacteria. This bacteria destroys the birds brain cells. This was excellent detective science.

The spread of aquatic weeds and cyano algae/bacteria is a major concern across the southeastern states. The application of herbicides and pesticides in the waterways is becoming standard practice. Fortunately Lake Glenville does not have a major growth or invasion of the plant pests. And so far the cyano algae has not been found in Lake Glenville.

Georgia Lake Management Class Winter Feb 2014 Doug Odell

A class for the identification of Water Plants and Algae was held by the Forestry Department of the University of Georgia at Athens. The class was excellent, but a bit of surprise. The class was designed for the required education credit for the Licensed Water Use pesticide and herbicide applicators in Ga. It was a large group as most of the Georgia water ways have invasive plants and invasive algae. It was good to see that applicators really do know the invasive species and chemical usage directions and restrictions.

The teaching staff was excellent and was most helpful in the identification of our algae samples. I now have a better idea of what the invasive water species look like. I have not seen any except one in Lake Glenville. And none of our algae samples were unwanted species. Most of the North Carolina impoundments have invasive plants and bluegreen algae. I have not seen any blue-green algae in Lake Glenville

Honor Air - Flight 16

EDITORS NOTE: Doug Odell recently received an award as a US Marine Corp Veteran to fly on "Honor Air Flight" from Knoxville to Washington DC on April 16,2014. The selection is a huge honor a special way to honor him and others for their service and sacrifice for our freedoms. I asked Doug to give us his account of that flight and day.

Honor Air - Flight 16 Doug Odell

Honor Air Flight 16 left the Knoxville airport at 9:15 on April 16th. When the servicemen and women returned from WWII there were local celebrations. As time went by a number of other war memorials were built and dedicated. The WWII memorial was the last to be built and was finally dedicated in 2005. The Honor Air and Honor Flight program was created to provide the WWII Vets with a no cost trip to see their WWII memorial. As the number of WWII Vets decrease the Korean Vets are being added to the program.

Flight 16 had 130 vets and about 50 guardians. There were two dozen WWII vets with two women vets. One of our vets was on Normandy Beach on D-day and one had been with Merril's Marauder's. Merril's Marauder's fought in the Burma Jungles to blunt the Japanese thrust from China into Bruma. Less than 20% of the original members returned.

Boarding our chartered flight we had send off well wishes from a Service group, Junior ROTC unit, Boy Scouts and volunteers. Arrival in DC was met with a two fire engine "Hose Down and flags on the apron. In the terminal there were volunteer greeters and a sixty member men's chorus.

Boarding four buses with police escort we passed the Pentagon and stopped at the Air Force Memorial. Continuing we stopped at the Korean and Viet Nan Memorials. The Korean nineteen large sized "grunts" in ponchos was impressive. Then on to the WWII Memorial. It is huge. We then passed the Navy Memorial and stopped at the Marine Memorial – Iwo Jima statue.

The next stop was Arlington Cemetery and Tomb of the Unknown – for changing of the guard. Close to where the buses stopped were the memorials for the "Discover" and the "Challenger" crews. I worked at Cape Canaveral during the early military missile testing including the early space flights.. Busses back to the airport and a sendoff to Knoxville with boxed dinners, military songs and Mail Call. Letters and notes from family, friends, strangers and even school children. Thanks for the many notes and letters. Arrival at Knoxville was met by bands, balloon arches, flags and a cheering crowd of more than 1000 well wishers.

Facts About Lake Glenville

- Dam completion: October 23, 1941
- Size: 4.5 miles long, 1470 acres, 26 miles of shoreline
- MSL: 3500 feet altitude at dam
- Maximum depth of lake at flood level: 125 feet
- Highest lake east of the Mississippi River
- Major supplying streams: Hurricane Creek, Norton Creek, Mill Creek, Cedar Creek, and Pine Creek.



BOARD MEMBERS:

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"Boat Friendly"

- Be aware of, and obey the North Carolina laws of boating.
- Personal watercraft (jet skis) should observe the rules like any other watercraft
- Slow to 5 mph if within 200 ft. of boats, swimmers, fisherman, or docks. When "in doubt", slow down!
- YOU are responsible for the wake that your boat is throwing and should consider the consequences to others (i.e. dock damage, capsizing small craft, and bank soil erosion)
- Always "give way" to (pass behind) non-powered boats such as sailboats, kayaks, canoes, and rowing craft. (200 ft. is a good gesture)
- Ski and raft towing boats should never go beyond 100 ft. of their disabled skiers and have an observer aboard as well as a driver.
- Keep noise within its proper perspective. Sound carries a long distance on water. Keep radios and recorders at a low volume.

- Pick up any "man-made" trash or litter you see floating in the water.
- Always stop and offer assistance to stranded boaters.
